Volunteer Ball Spotters

Safe Practice Note and Responsibilities

At N&C Golf Club there are certain events / competitions, eg. Pro Am day, Open competitions etc... where we ask members to volunteer for certain activities to help with the smooth running of the day. One of these activities is ball spotting and typically we like to have ball spotters on the fairways on certain holes, eg. the 2nd, 4th, 7th, 10th etc....

The purpose of having ball spotters is to try and track errant tee shots. This in turn helps with the pace of play.

Ball spotters will each be given a Stop/Go paddle board (red on one side and green on the other). When players arrive on the tee ball spotters should indicate to the players if it is safe, ie. clear, to play their tee shots – green for Yes and red for No. After a green signal is given ball spotters should stand to the side of the fairway but in a position where they can see the players and that the players can see them.

The tee shots should be tracked through the air as far as possible. If a tee shot is hit towards a ball spotter the player should shout 'fore' and the ball spotters should take evasive action.

If the tee shot finishes on the fairway or can be seen and is in play ball spotters should give the green signal. If not, show the red signal giving the player the option to play a second ball, eg. provisional.

When we ask for ball spotter volunteers there is invariably a starter on the first tee. The starter will be informed as to which holes there are ball spotters and he / she will include this as part of the briefing to each group of players before they tee off.
