## Risk Assessment for Buggy use (includes both 1 and 2 seater buggies) at N&C golf club for different weather and ground conditions

The following **Risk Assessment** was carried out by Phil Allen with input from the General Manager, Gareth Williams, and the Head Greenkeeper, Chris Ball.

A recent document from the National Golf Clubs' Advisory Association (NGCAA) says that the safe use of buggies on the golf course must be considered to ensure compliance with both Equality and Health & Safety legislation. This means that member and visitor golfers who have a physical disability must have the same opportunity to play on the golf course and use the club's facilities as non-disabled persons. Golf clubs should make every effort to accommodate both disabled and non-disabled golfers and can make reasonable adjustments to help satisfy this objective. However, golf clubs should consider and make allowances for important factors like health and safety reasons, eg. slippery conditions etc... and take measures to avoid or reduce anticipated damage to the course, eg. tyre and skid marks from buggies.

People on foot must be afforded the right of way at all times.</li> <li>Buggy operators should always consider the terrain as well as the environmental factors that may affect vehicle safety:</li> <li>1 Drive only as fast as the terrain and safety considerations allow.</li> <li>2 Drive the buggy straight up and down slopes to reduce the risk of the buggy tipping over.</li> <li>3 Slow down before corners.</li> <li>4 Execute all turns at reduced speed.</li> <li>5 Avoid sudden stops or changes in direction.</li> <li>9 Buggies should only be operated on golf course property and in daylight hours.</li> <li>10. The consumption of alcohol and/or the improper use of drugs when operating a buggy is strictly forbidden.</li> <li>11. Buggies should only be used for the number of occupants it was designed to carry and only be people who are authorised to use one.</li> <li>12. Buggies must not be driven on to tees, greens, the slopes leading up to them or between green side bunkers and greens.</li> <li>13. ## \* Scenario

As above, for each day of the year the Head Greenkeeper will allocate which Scenario applies for each given day. For circa. 95% of the time it is anticipated that Scenario 1 will apply (and will be the default position) where weather and course conditions allow normal play.

## Additional Measures available for all of the risks identified above:

These mitigating measures and restrictions are in place to help satisfy our legal and moral responsibilities to provide a safe environment for all and to help preserve the condition of the golf course. It should also be noted that all staff and golfers should be aware of and exercise a **Duty of Care** to minimise the risks of personal injury, injury to others and damage to the course.
